What is Geri-EM.com?

Geri-EM stands for GERIatric Emergency Medicine. Geri-EM,com is a continuing medical education website developed in Toronto, Ontario, Canada and launched in fall 2013. The website can be used by anyone anywhere is the world. There is no cost to participate. Visit Geri-EM at www.geri-EM.com.

Who can use Geri-EM?

This e-learning website was designed primarily for physicians working in emergency departments who want to provide optimal care to their older patients.

It will benefit all health-care providers who see older patients as part of their practice – in primary care, in hospital, in long-term care, or in the community, such as family physicians, geriatricians, internists, general and orthopaedic surgeons, nurses, pharmacists.

Members of the public with an interest in geriatric care are welcome to explore the content on this website. We encourage you to register and participate in group discussions and interactive content.

Can I use this as education for students, trainees or colleagues?

Yes! We encourage this use. Our aim is to share Geri-EM widely.

What topics are covered?
